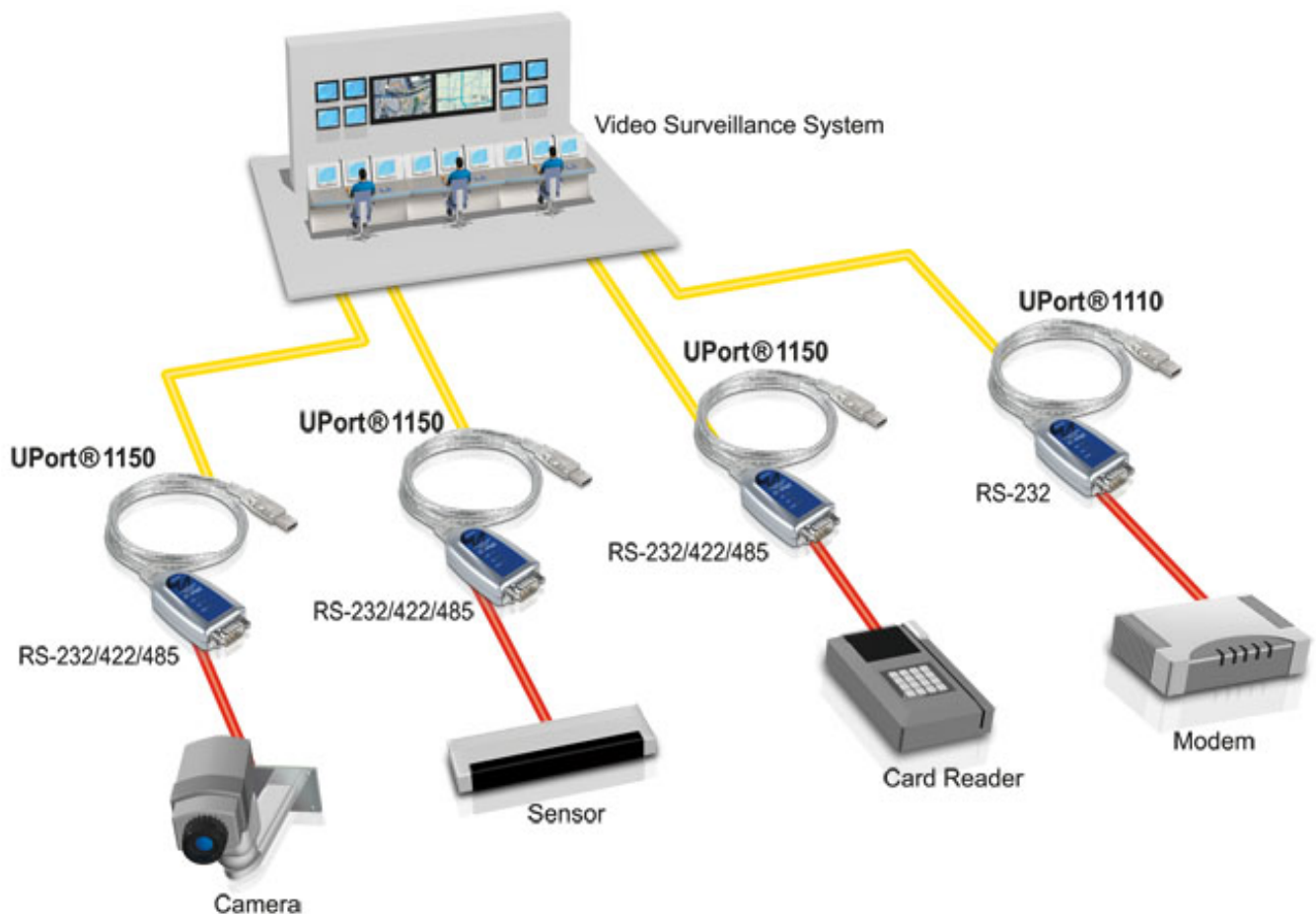

The most basic video surveillance setup is a single camera connected directly to a monitor and recording device. A client that designs video surveillance systems needed USB-to-serial converters to connect devices to the management system. Their system needed to be able to

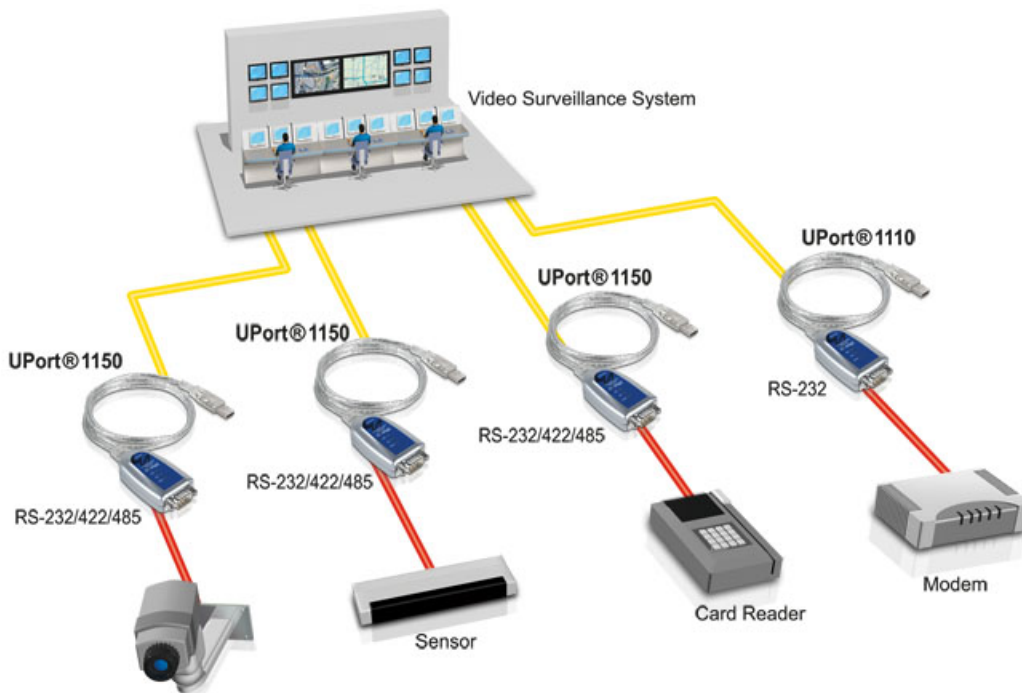
connect to serial devices such as card readers, modems, video cameras, and sensors. The client required a converter with the following characteristics:

- USB 2.0 compatibility
- RS-232 or RS-422/485 interface
- Stability and reliability
- Cost-effectiveness
